

About Your Property Taxes

Property tax bills will be coming out around Valentine's Day. This brief article is meant to help you understand your bill, of which only 4.1% pays for services you receive from Clyde Hill (see chart).




Distribution of property tax bill in Clyde Hill in 2020

What's New?

For the first time since 2015, Clyde Hill is increasing its property tax rate in order to help relieve a budget deficit trend that began in 2019. (2021 marks the third year of the trend.)

This means that the amount you pay in property taxes to Clyde Hill will increase depending on the value of your property; the impact of which is estimated to be ~\$200/yr to the average household. It is expected that Clyde Hill will still have the second lowest property tax rate in King County, a rate which is expected to be half of Medina's (see chart).



The seven lowest property tax rates (per \$1,000 of assessed valuation) in King County in 2020. Clyde Hill's rate is adjusted on this chart to the new 2021 tax rate - Clyde Hill's 2020 rate was \$0.34

It is important to note that many cities make it a standard practice to raise their property taxes every year. Clyde Hill has been able to avoid doing this for the past half-decade by utilizing other means, thereby passing on those permanent savings to you, the residents.

Metro Changes

King County Metro has notified the City that they are suspending/reducing bus routes in Clyde Hill.

Route 246 service is suspended as part of the temporary reduced service network due to the COVID pandemic and its associated loss of ridership and revenue.

How to Reduce Rats in Your Yard

- Rats eat everything. Take away their food, such as bird feeders and fruit dropped by trees.
- Keep garbage can lids tightly closed; use rodent-resistant composters.
- Keeps yards clean. Remove piles of garbage and junk. Stack wood 18 inches off the ground. Trim back blackberries, shrubs and tall grasses.
- Rats can get into very small spaces. Close up all holes in and under buildings.

COVID-19: Healthy Washington—Roadmap to Recovery

Gov. Inslee has launched Healthy Washington - Roadmap to Recovery which will use a regional approach for its phased recovery plan. We are currently in Phase 1B tier 1. Even if you are vaccinated, continue to wear your mask (if able), maintain at least a six foot distance from others, and wash/sanitize your hands frequently. Keep your gatherings to your immediate family/friend "bubble" and avoid exposure to others. As of 1/19/2021, Clyde Hill reportedly has had 986 citizens tested for COVID-19 with 59 positives, 3 hospitalizations, and 1 death. This pandemic remains real and concerning. Please continue to practice safety measures.
